- Free rural delivery of mail began in the United States, October 1, 1896.
- Chester A. Arthur, 21st President of the United States, born in Fairfield, Vt., October 5, 1829.
- Chicago fire began, and burned for about 30 hours, October 8, 1871. On Oct. 9, 1911, Fire Marshals' Association sponsored the first National Prevention Day. In 1920, President Woodrow Wilson issued the first National Fire Prevention Day proclamation. By 1925, President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed the first National Fire Prevention Week, which was Oct. 4-10, 1925.
